What is an “Open Society?”

An Open Society is a society based on the recognition that nobody has a monopoly on the truth, that different people have different views and interests, and that there is a need for institutions to protect the rights of all people to allow them to live together in peace. The term “open society” was popularized by the philosopher Karl Popper in his 1945 book Open Society and Its Enemies. Broadly speaking, an open society is characterized by a reliance on the rule of law, the existence of a democratically elected government, a diverse and vigorous civil society, and a respect for minorities and minority opinions.

Program Description:

The Open Society Scholarship Programs is pleased to offer supplementary grants to students from select countries of Southeastern Europe, the former Soviet Union, Mongolia, the Middle/Near East, and South Asia. The purpose of the program is to enable qualified students to pursue full-time doctoral studies in the **Humanities and Social Sciences** at accredited universities in Asia, Australia, the Middle/Near East, and North America.

Each award will provide partial funding for one year of full-time doctoral study. Recipients of GSGP grants will have the option to re-apply for an additional two awards after the original grant. Applicants seeking grant renewals must submit a new application for each renewal year. The total number of years a recipient may hold a GSGP grant is three years. Grantees applying for their second or third awards will compete with the other renewal applicants each year. A second or third grant is therefore not guaranteed.

Only students who have been accepted into a full-time doctoral (Ph.D.) program at an accredited university are eligible to apply.

Grants are provided to help cover costs in the following categories:

1. **Tuition and fees** – not to exceed 50% of tuition and fees per academic year;
2. **Living expenses** – students who have succeeded in funding their tuition, either through scholarships or tuition waivers, are eligible for housing and living funds;
3. **Other** – students who have secured all necessary funds but cannot afford additional expenses, such as travel to/from their host country, books, materials, health insurance, etc., are eligible for additional funds.

Only applicants with confirmed financial support from additional sources will receive supplementary grants.

Grants will be awarded on the basis of academic record, merit of the proposed study, applicant's long-term goals, and financial need.

For the academic year 2011-2012 grants will be awarded in amounts ranging from \$1,000 to \$10,000

In no case may applicants request grant assistance for the support of:

1. *accompanying child/children or spouse;*
2. *federal and/or state taxes;*
3. *computer hardware, software or other computer-related equipment;*
4. *automobile-related expenses of any type.*

As part of the grant package, finalists of the program will be invited by the Open Society Foundations to attend an annual GSGP Spring conference in the Spring of 2012. Travel costs from grantees' host universities in North America and accommodation will be covered by the Open Society Foundations. Further details will be sent to grantees in late 2011.

Eligibility Criteria:

1. Candidates must be nationals of one of the following countries:

2. Candidates must be pursuing **full-time** doctoral studies in the *social sciences and humanities* at an accredited university.
3. Candidates must demonstrate proficiency in the spoken and written language of their host institution.
4. Candidates who are alumni or current grantees of any Open Society Foundations program must be in good standing with all grants (including submitting all relevant reports on time, etc.)
5. **ONLY** applicants who have already been awarded partial or full tuition, room and board stipends, or other types of financial support may apply.

Members of minority groups are encouraged to apply.

Please note that if selected, grantees will be required to maintain full-time student status and abide by the terms and conditions outlined in a countersigned contract letter.

Ineligibility:

1. These awards offer partial support towards full time doctoral studies in the *social sciences and humanities* only. Requests for support in the following fields will **not** be considered:
 - Business Administration/Management
 - Computer Science
 - Finance/Banking/Marketing
 - Engineering
 - Hard & Natural Sciences (Physics, Biology, Chemistry, etc.)
 - Mathematics
 - Medical Sciences
 - Fine or Performing Arts
2. Applications for study in the student's home country or in any of the countries listed above will not be considered.
3. Applications for non-doctoral study, language preparation, and/or summer school courses will not be considered.
4. Students with permanent resident status, dual citizenship, and/or asylum seekers in the country of the host academic institution are not eligible to apply. Only those with valid student visas, or relevant student status, in the host country are eligible.

All applications are due by **April 1, 2011** and envelopes containing supporting materials or paper applications must be postmarked on or before: **April 1, 2011**.

LATE APPLICATIONS WILL BE AUTOMATICALLY DISQUALIFIED.

Documents Required Upon Application:

In addition to the application form below, please send one copy of the following. Any documents that are not in English should be accompanied by an official or university translation.

1. Curriculum Vitae (CV should include complete work history, extra-curricular activities, academic awards and publications)
2. Copy of your official letter of admission from the academic institution (if not available, explain why)
3. Official undergraduate and graduate school transcripts (new applicants only)
4. Copy of an official letter from your institution outlining the details of your scholarship or financial aid award (if separate from item 2 above) and any other documents confirming additional support
5. Copy of the identification pages of your passport
6. Copy of your visa (students studying in the U.S should also enclose a copy of your I-20 or DS-2019 form)
7. Two current academic reference letters from current professors who have direct knowledge of your work and abilities, and can speak to your progress towards completing your degree program. Students already enrolled in a Ph.D. program must furnish at least one letter of reference from a professor in the department in which they are studying, as well as a current academic progress report.

Please Note: Omission of one or more of the documents mentioned above renders your application incomplete and will result in disqualification. In the event that a required document will become available only after you submit your application, please indicate this in your application and send the document as soon as possible.

Selection:

Students are selected in an open competition announced once a year. A selection committee makes all grant decisions based on the quality of the application, written essays, academic records, and future goals. Preference will be given to students who demonstrate a clear commitment to the academic and social development of their home community or region. Applicants should take into consideration the three-year funding limit when applying, and anticipate the period of their study when they will most benefit from a GSGP award. Finalists will be notified in June 2011; **decisions of the selection committee are final.**

2. **Academic and Research Goals.** Please describe the focus of your dissertation research in geographic and theoretical terms. If you have not yet designed your dissertation proposal, please describe the area of research you would like to pursue. Please explain why you have chosen to pursue your studies at this particular university.
3. What contributions do you hope to make to open society in your home country or region, using your professional expertise and personal experiences, and whom do you expect to benefit directly and/or indirectly? What is the role of the university in strengthening civil society and generating social transformation?

Re-Applicants (3 essays):

Essays should be a maximum 300 – 500 words each.

1. Please clearly state where you are in the course of your doctoral studies (coursework, proposal writing, research, fieldwork, dissertation writing, etc.), addressing any achievements and/or challenges from the past year, and how these have shaped the development of your research.
2. How do you plan to apply your research to your professional pursuits after the completion of your doctorate? What are your career goals within the next 5 years and what are your strategies for accomplishing these?
3. What associations do you have with institutions or organizations in your home country? How have you maintained these connections and how will you contribute to these institutions or organizations upon the completion of your doctoral studies?
